Observations, trends and information for the construction industry

Construction is back and it's back with a vengeance, 2014 finished off with Overall US at just over \$960 Billion a 7% increase over 2013. 2015 is showing no signs of slowing down, first quarter 2015 US Construction came in at nearly \$207 billion, up 3.2% over what it was a year ago. Analysts predict this this trend to continue through 2017.

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The Construction Put In Place (CPIP) indicates an overall continued expansion of the US Construction industry. The majority of construction within the detailed categories has picked up or stabilized in 2014. Employment numbers from the first quarter show a continued increase in construction employment.

And now for the bad news:

Contractors are experiencing lower than expected margins during this construction cycle. Already companies are reporting their first quarter margins at lower than normal expectations. Our next SOTI report will explain and draw this correlation in detail.

Construction Across the County

The set of charts below gives us a look at the different construction segment in different US Census regions across the country for the first quarter of 2015. The south showed the most activity with the residential market being more than double that of other areas across the country. Even the industrial and commercial markets were significantly larger in the south than the rest of the county, during the first quarter.





Employment numbers continue to be steadily increasing in 2015. Construction employment has increased 1.1% since the beginning of the year. A year to year comparison shows employment up 4.6% in both March and April, compared to March and April of 2014.

How long will this cycle last? Is a question that is on everyone's mind. So let's take a look back at the cycles over the past 40 years, by equalizing the dollars so a dollar from 1975 has the same value as one from 2013. This gives us a comparison of the size and duration of the cycles that have taken place in the construction industry. The 1991 cycle showed us a period of unprecedented growth and duration for the construction industry. Although this cycle shows us starting out following the same trend of growth as the previous cycle, when we compare this to the US Construction Trend of the market size, we see the market nearing its' peak size in a couple of years. Examining the duration of the 1975 and 1982 cycles, we see them reaching their peak after 4 years, characterized by periods of accelerated growth before reaching their peak.



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
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Lower Than Expected Margins

If you haven't been experiencing it, you've been hearing from fellow Contractors about ever thinning margins. We took a look at publically traded construction companies who had posted their first quarter results, and compared them to results from the previous quarters. The weighted average of the gross margin showed a 21% reduction from the fourth quarter of 2014 to the first quarter of 2015. The operating margin showed a 29% reduction from the fourth quarter of 2014 to the first quarter of 2015. These reduced margins provide a cursory indicator to all contractors, that they need to be ever vigilant on their projects and monitor them during all phases of the project life cycle.





What does this mean to you, now that competition in the industry and traditional construction methods has resulted in significantly reduced margins? This means the only way to increase your margins is to reduce your costs. Since equipment, materials, permits, bonding and insurance are essentially fixed costs; the only cost you can control is your labor cost, therefore you need to be able to reduce your labor costs without reducing everyone's wages. The only way to do this is to increase your labors' productivity, through better planning, better management of labor, and the utilization of prefabrication.

In September, the team at MCA will join others at the MCA Symposium on "Workforce Training to Manage Labor in a Prefabrication Environment", which will be held Thursday, September 17th and 18th 2015 in Oak Brook, Illinois vicinity in conjunction with a training and users forum focusing on the tools of Agile Construction[®] (taking place Wednesday, September 16th). 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
